- 32 confirm, strengthen *and* establish you. ¹¹ To Him *be*

Read the passage through completely before looking at these questions.

Observation (What does it say?):

Consider the observation questions on the back of this page. What do you notice in this passage?

- Circle the ways Peter describes himself.
- Box the tasks he gives to elders.
- Underline instructions to everyone else.
- What else do you observe in this passage?

Interpretation (What does it mean?):

After observing the passage:

- Why would Peter exhort elders at this point in his letter?
- Why would he list his "credentials" before addressing the elders?
- How would you summarize the general commands he gives as he reaches the end of his letter?
- What would it look like for God to "exalt" you? What might be the "proper time"?
- What questions come to mind as you read?
- How would you title this passage?

Application (What does it mean for me?):

- What anxiety do you have right now? How do you "cast" that on God?
- How would resisting the devil be part of casting anxiety?
- Verse 10 sounds like a incentive. How do we make that incentive a practical reality to help us persevere through difficulties?
- How might this passage affect your understanding of who God is and what He is doing?

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For additional thought and discussion:

"Be sober, self-controlled" (νήφω, nēphō; used six times in NT, three of them in 1 Peter)

Therefore, prepare your minds for action, keep **sober in spirit**, fix your hope completely on the grace to be brought to you at the revelation of Jesus Christ. (1:13)

The end of all things is near; therefore, be of sound judgment and **sober spirit** for the purpose of prayer. (4:7)

Be of **sober spirit**, be on the alert. Your adversary, the devil, prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour. (5:8)

Inductive Bible Study

(A few general ideas)

Observation (What does it say?)

What <u>facts</u> do you **observe** about the passage that help bring out the writer's thought process?

- Who are the people involved?
- What action takes place?
- What type of literature is it (poetry, history, didactic, etc.)?
- What details are included or left out?
- Are any unusual words used?
- Is there symbolic language?
- What is the grammar of the passage (pronouns, prepositions, verb tenses)?
- Are words or ideas repeated?
- Any comparisons or contrasts?
- Any cause and effect?
- Are there indications of purpose ("in order that...")?
- Are there conclusions ("Therefore...")?
- Are there explanations?
- Does the passage logically break into sections?
- How would you summarize the passage?
- What would be a good "headline" for the passage?

Interpretation (What does it mean?)

What <u>questions</u> come to mind about the facts that would help you **interpret** the meaning?

- How would the original readers have understood the passage?
- What is the main emphasis?
- Why does the writer use repetition, or contrast, or unusual words?
- What does the grammar or structure of the passage reveal about the writer's thought pattern?
- Is there a logical sequence in the passage?
- How are different ideas in the passage connected?
- Are there any new ideas or concepts presented?
- Are there difficulties in the passage?

Application (What does it mean for me?)

What is the <u>impact</u> on your life? What **application** does the Holy Spirit want to show you?

- Is there a command to obey?
- Is there a promise to be thankful for?
- Is there an attribute of God to worship?
- Is there an example to follow?
