1 James, a servant of God and of the Lord Jesus Christ. 8 To the twelve tribes in the

9 Dispersion:

10 Greetings. 11 <sup>2</sup>Count it all joy, my brothers,

12 when you meet trials of various 13 kinds, <sup>3</sup> for you know that the 14 testing of your faith produces steadfastness. <sup>4</sup> And let 15 16 steadfastness have its full 17 effect, that you may be perfect

18 and complete, lacking in

19 nothing.

20 <sup>5</sup> If any of you lacks wisdom, 21 let him ask God, who gives 22 generously to all without 23 reproach, and it will be given him. <sup>6</sup> But let him ask in faith, 25 with no doubting, for the one 26

who doubts is like a wave of 27 the sea that is driven and tossed

28 by the wind. <sup>7</sup> For that person 29 must not suppose that he will 30

receive anything from the Lord; <sup>8</sup> he is a double-minded man,

31 32 unstable in all his ways.

33

<sup>9</sup>Let the lowly brother boast in his exaltation, <sup>10</sup> and the rich in 34

his humiliation, because like a 35

flower of the grass he will pass 37 away. 11 For the sun rises with

38 its scorching heat and withers

the grass; its flower falls, and

40 its beauty perishes. So also will

42 midst of his pursuits. 43 <sup>12</sup> Blessed is the man who

remains steadfast under trial. 45 for when he has stood the test

46 he will receive the crown of 47 life, which God has promised to

48 those who love him. <sup>13</sup> Let no 49

one say when he is tempted, "I 50 am being tempted by God," for

51 God cannot be tempted with 52 evil, and he himself tempts no

53 one. <sup>14</sup> But each person is

54 tempted when he is lured and enticed by his own desire. 55

56 <sup>15</sup> Then desire when it has 57 conceived gives birth to sin,

58 and sin when it is fully grown

59 brings forth death.

<sup>16</sup> Do not be deceived, my 60 61 beloved brothers. <sup>17</sup> Every good

gift and every perfect gift is 62

from above, coming down from 63 64 the Father of lights, with whom 65 there is no variation or shadow

due to change. <sup>18</sup> Of his own 66 will he brought us forth by the 67

word of truth, that we should be 68 69 a kind of firstfruits of his

70 creatures.

71 <sup>19</sup> Know this, my beloved 72 brothers: let every person be

73 quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger; <sup>20</sup> for the anger 74

75 of man does not produce the 76 righteousness of God.

<sup>21</sup> Therefore put away all 78 filthiness and rampant

wickedness and receive with the rich man fade away in the 80 meekness the implanted word,

81 which is able to save your

82 souls.

83 <sup>22</sup> But be doers of the word, and

84 not hearers only, deceiving

yourselves. <sup>23</sup> For if anyone is a 85 86 hearer of the word and not a

87 doer, he is like a man who

88 looks intently at his natural face

in a mirror. <sup>24</sup> For he looks at 89 90 himself and goes away and at

91 once forgets what he was like.

92 <sup>25</sup> But the one who looks into 93 the perfect law, the law of

94 liberty, and perseveres, being 95 no hearer who forgets but a

96 doer who acts, he will be

97 blessed in his doing.

98 <sup>26</sup> If anyone thinks he is

99 religious and does not bridle his 100 tongue but deceives his heart,

101 this person's religion is

worthless. <sup>27</sup> Religion that is 102 103 pure and undefiled before God

104 the Father is this: to visit

105 orphans and widows in their 106 affliction, and to keep oneself

107 unstained from the world.

108 2 My brothers, show no

109 partiality as you hold the faith 110

in our Lord Jesus Christ, the 111 Lord of glory. <sup>2</sup> For if a man

112 wearing a gold ring and fine

113 clothing comes into your 114 assembly, and a poor man in

115 shabby clothing also comes in,

116 <sup>3</sup> and if you pay attention to the

117 one who wears the fine clothing

118	and say, "You sit here in a good
119	place," while you say to the
120	poor man, "You stand over
121	there," or, "Sit down at my
122	feet," 4 have you not then made
	reet, mave you not then made
123	distinctions among yourselves
124	and become judges with evil
125	thoughts? <sup>5</sup> Listen, my beloved
126	brothers, has not God chosen
127	those who are poor in the world
128	
	to be rich in faith and heirs of
129	the kingdom, which he has
130	promised to those who love
131	him? <sup>6</sup> But you have dishonored
132	the poor man. Are not the rich
133	the ones who oppress you, and
134	the ones who drag you into
135	court? <sup>7</sup> Are they not the ones
136	who blaspheme the honorable
137	name by which you were
138	called?
139	<sup>8</sup> If you really fulfill the royal
140	law according to the Scripture,
141	
	"You shall love your neighbor
142	as yourself," you are doing
143	well. <sup>9</sup> But if you show
144	partiality, you are committing
145	sin and are convicted by the
146	law as transgressors. <sup>10</sup> For
147	whoever keeps the whole law
148	but fails in one point has
149	become guilty of all of it. 11 For
150	he who said, "Do not commit
151	adultery," also said, "Do not
152	murder." If you do not commit
153	adultery but do murder, you
154	have become a transgressor of
155	the law. <sup>12</sup> So speak and so act
156	as those who are to be judged
157	under the law of liberty. <sup>13</sup> For
158	judgment is without mercy to
159	one who has shown no mercy.
160	Mercy triumphs over judgment.
161	<sup>14</sup> What good is it, my brothers,
162	if someone says he has faith but
163	does not have works? Can that
164	faith save him? <sup>15</sup> If a brother or
165	sister is poorly clothed and
166	lacking in daily food, <sup>16</sup> and one
167	of you says to them, "Go in
168	peace, be warmed and filled,"
169	without giving them the things
170	needed for the body, what good
171	is that? <sup>17</sup> So also faith by itself,

172	if it does not have works, is
173	dead.
174	<sup>18</sup> But someone will say, "You
175	have faith and I have works."
176	Show me your faith apart from
177	your works, and I will show
178	you my faith by my works.
179	<sup>19</sup> You believe that God is one;
180	you do well. Even the demons

181	believe—and shudder! <sup>20</sup> Do
182	you want to be shown, you
183	foolish person, that faith apart
184	from works is useless? <sup>21</sup> Was
185	not Abraham our father
186	justified by works when he
187	offered up his son Isaac on the
188	altar? <sup>22</sup> You see that faith was
189	active along with his works,
190	and faith was completed by his
191	works; <sup>23</sup> and the Scripture was
192	fulfilled that says, "Abraham
193	believed God, and it was
194	
-	counted to him as
195	righteousness"—and he was
196	called a friend of God. <sup>24</sup> You
197	see that a person is justified by
198	works and not by faith alone.
199	<sup>25</sup> And in the same way was not
200	also Rahab the prostitute
201	justified by works when she
202	received the messengers and
203	sent them out by another way?
204	<sup>26</sup> For as the body apart from
205	the spirit is dead, so also faith
206	
	apart from works is dead.
207	3 Not many of you should
208	become teachers, my brothers,
209	for you know that we who
210	teach will be judged with
211	greater strictness. <sup>2</sup> For we all
212	
	stumble in many ways. And if
213	anyone does not stumble in
214	what he says, he is a perfect
215	man, able also to bridle his
216	whole body. <sup>3</sup> If we put bits into
217	the mouths of horses so that
218	they obey us, we guide their
219	whole bodies as well. <sup>4</sup> Look at
220	the ships also: though they are
221	so large and are driven by
222	strong winds, they are guided
223	by a very small rudder
224	wherever the will of the pilot
225	directs. <sup>5</sup> So also the tongue is a
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226 small member, yet it boasts of
227
      great things.

      How great a forest is set ablaze
229
      by such a small fire! <sup>6</sup> And the
230
      tongue is a fire, a world of
231
      unrighteousness. The tongue is
232
      set among our members,
233
      staining the whole body, setting
234 on fire the entire course of life,
235
      and set on fire by hell. <sup>7</sup> For
236
      every kind of beast and bird, of
237
      reptile and sea creature, can be
238
      tamed and has been tamed by
239
      mankind, 8 but no human being
240
      can tame the tongue. It is a
241
      restless evil, full of deadly
242
      poison. 9 With it we bless our
243
      Lord and Father, and with it we
244
      curse people who are made in
      the likeness of God. <sup>10</sup> From the
245
246
      same mouth come blessing and
247
      cursing. My brothers, these
248
      things ought not to be so.
249
      <sup>11</sup> Does a spring pour forth from
250
      the same opening both fresh
      and salt water? <sup>12</sup> Can a fig tree,
251
252
      my brothers, bear olives, or a
253
      grapevine produce figs? Neither
254
      can a salt pond yield fresh
255
      water.

      <sup>13</sup> Who is wise and
257
      understanding among you? By
258
      his good conduct let him show
259
      his works in the meekness of
      wisdom. <sup>14</sup> But if you have
260

      bitter jealousy and selfish
262
      ambition in your hearts, do not
      boast and be false to the truth.
263

      <sup>15</sup> This is not the wisdom that
265
      comes down from above, but is
266
      earthly, unspiritual, demonic.
267
      <sup>16</sup> For where jealousy and
268
      selfish ambition exist, there
269
      will be disorder and every vile
270
      practice. <sup>17</sup> But the wisdom
271
      from above is first pure, then
272
      peaceable, gentle, open to
273
      reason, full of mercy and good
      fruits, impartial and sincere.

275
      <sup>18</sup> And a harvest of
276
      righteousness is sown in peace
277
      by those who make peace.
278
      4 What causes quarrels and
      what causes fights among you?
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280	Is it not this, that your passions
281	are at war within you? <sup>2</sup> You
282	desire and do not have, so you
283	murder. You covet and cannot
284	obtain, so you fight and quarrel.
285	You do not have, because you
286	do not ask. <sup>3</sup> You ask and do
287	not receive, because you ask
288	wrongly, to spend it on your
	wrongry, to spend it on your
289	passions. <sup>4</sup> You adulterous
290	people! Do you not know that
291	friendship with the world is
292	enmity with God? Therefore
293	whoever wishes to be a friend
294	of the world makes himself an
295	enemy of God. <sup>5</sup> Or do you
296	suppose it is to no purpose that
297	the Scripture says, "He yearns
298	jealously over the spirit that he
299	has made to dwell in us"? <sup>6</sup> But
300	he gives more grace. Therefore
301	it says, "God opposes the proud
302	but gives grace to the humble."
303	<sup>7</sup> Submit yourselves therefore to
	C 1 D : 4.1 1 11
304	God. Resist the devil, and he
305	will flee from you. <sup>8</sup> Draw near
306	to God, and he will draw near
307	to you. Cleanse your hands,
308	you sinners, and purify your
309	hearts, you double-minded. <sup>9</sup> Be
310	wretched and mourn and weep.
311	Let your laughter be turned to
312	mourning and your joy to
313	gloom. <sup>10</sup> Humble yourselves
314	
	before the Lord, and he will
315	exalt you.
316	<sup>11</sup> Do not speak evil against one
317	another, brothers. The one who
318	speaks against a brother or
319	judges his brother, speaks evil
320	against the law and judges the
321	law. But if you judge the law,
322	you are not a doer of the law
323	but a judge. <sup>12</sup> There is only one
324	
	lawgiver and judge, he who is
325	able to save and to destroy. But
326	who are you to judge your
327	neighbor?
328	<sup>13</sup> Come now, you who say,
329	"Today or tomorrow we will go
330	into such and such a town and
221	anond a ricer there and trade

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and make a profit"— 14 yet you
333 do not know what tomorrow
334
      will bring. What is your life?
335 For you are a mist that appears
336 for a little time and then
      vanishes. 15 Instead you ought
337
338 to say, "If the Lord wills, we
339
      will live and do this or that."
340 <sup>16</sup> As it is, you boast in your
341
      arrogance. All such boasting is
      evil. <sup>17</sup> So whoever knows the
342
343 right thing to do and fails to do
      it, for him it is sin.
345
      5 Come now, you rich, weep
346
      and howl for the miseries that
347
      are coming upon you. <sup>2</sup> Your
348 riches have rotted and your
349
      garments are moth-eaten.
350 <sup>3</sup> Your gold and silver have
      corroded, and their corrosion
352
      will be evidence against you
353
      and will eat your flesh like fire.
354
      You have laid up treasure in the
355 last days. <sup>4</sup>Behold, the wages
356
      of the laborers who mowed
357
      your fields, which you kept
358
      back by fraud, are crying out
359
      against you, and the cries of the
360
      harvesters have reached the
     ears of the Lord of hosts. 5 You
361
362 have lived on the earth in
363
      luxury and in self-indulgence.
364
      You have fattened your hearts
365 in a day of slaughter. <sup>6</sup> You
366 have condemned and murdered
367 the righteous person. He does
368
      not resist you.
369
      <sup>7</sup>Be patient, therefore, brothers,
370 until the coming of the Lord.
371
      See how the farmer waits for
      the precious fruit of the earth,
372
373
      being patient about it, until it
      receives the early and the late
374
375
      rains. <sup>8</sup> You also, be patient.
376 Establish your hearts, for the
377
      coming of the Lord is at hand.
378
      <sup>9</sup>Do not grumble against one
379
      another, brothers, so that you
380 may not be judged; behold, the
381
      Judge is standing at the door.
382
      <sup>10</sup> As an example of suffering
383
      and patience, brothers, take the
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prophets who spoke in the
385
      name of the Lord. 11 Behold, we
386
      consider those blessed who
387
      remained steadfast. You have
388
      heard of the steadfastness of
389
      Job, and you have seen the
390
      purpose of the Lord, how the
391
      Lord is compassionate and
392
      merciful.
393
      <sup>12</sup> But above all, my brothers,
394
      do not swear, either by heaven
395
      or by earth or by any other
396
      oath, but let your "yes" be yes
397
      and your "no" be no, so that
398
      you may not fall under
399
      condemnation.
400
      <sup>13</sup> Is anyone among you
401
      suffering? Let him pray. Is
402
      anyone cheerful? Let him sing
403
      praise. 14 Is anyone among you
404
      sick? Let him call for the elders
405
      of the church, and let them pray
406
      over him, anointing him with
407
      oil in the name of the Lord.
408
      <sup>15</sup> And the prayer of faith will
409
      save the one who is sick, and
410
      the Lord will raise him up. And
411
      if he has committed sins, he
      will be forgiven. 16 Therefore,
412
413
      confess your sins to one
414
      another and pray for one
415
      another, that you may be
416
      healed. The prayer of a
417
      righteous person has great
418
      power as it is working. <sup>17</sup> Elijah
419
      was a man with a nature like
420
      ours, and he prayed fervently
421
      that it might not rain, and for
422
      three years and six months it
423
      did not rain on the earth.
424
      <sup>18</sup> Then he prayed again, and
425
      heaven gave rain, and the earth
426
      bore its fruit.
427
      <sup>19</sup> My brothers, if anyone
428
      among you wanders from the
429
      truth and someone brings him
      back, <sup>20</sup> let him know that
430
431
      whoever brings back a sinner
432
      from his wandering will save
433
      his soul from death and will
434
     cover a multitude of sins.
